"Why Worship Matters" - Spring Conference Theme First Baptist Alameda Hosts May 12 Gathering

The place of worship in church and personal life will be viewed from multiple perspectives at PCBA's Annual Spring Conference, to be held at the First Baptist Church of Alameda on Saturday, May 12. Jennifer Davidson, Assistant Professor of Worship and Theology at the American Baptist Seminary of the West, will be keynote speaker addressing the conference theme, "Why Worship Matters." Dr. Davidson holds the Ph.D. degree from the Graduate Theological Union and serves on the Commission for Baptist Worship and Spirituality for the Baptist World Alliance and chairs the Task Force for Emerging Theologians for the denomination.

A panel presentation on intercultural worship is planned and five workshops will be offered: Building Media Ministry, Liturgical Art Brightens Worship, How Hymns Add to Worship, Negro Spirituals Add to Worship, and Congregational Care Relates to Worship. The closing worship service will conclude at 3:30.

Where do ministers come from?

It was clear to Baptist leaders in the newly-developing state of California that provision needed to be made for the training of ministers on the west coast if congregations were to be adequately served. As early as 1871, just 42 years after the gold rush, a seminary was founded which was to become American Baptist Seminary of the West.

Members of the Pacific Coast Baptist Association will be interested to know of the role played by people from congregations within our embrace. The seed for the idea of a Baptist seminary was planted by Charles Hobart, then pastor of the First Baptist Church of Oakland, and it was there in 1890 that the first seminary classes were held. Oakland's First Baptist Church also contributed the seminary's first president, Edgar Harkness Gray.

Moving the seminary to Berkeley was encouraged by President Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the University of California, an active deacon in the first Baptist church of Berkeley. After re-locating, the seminary called on the leadership of Claiborne Milton Hill as its president. Dr. Hill was then Pastor of Tenth Avenue Baptist Church, an antecedent congregation of Lakeshore Avenue Baptist Church. During Dr. Hill's tenure, another Baptist institution, California College, merged with the seminary, resulting in a name change to Berkeley Baptist Divinity School. The present name of the seminary came decades later from a merger with the California Baptist Theological Seminary in Covina.

Theological and pastoral education has remained the centerpiece of academic preparation for ministry. The gift of leadership in changing times and the inter-relation of the schools of the Graduate Theological Union and with the University of California have led to preparation that is ecumenical and inter-racial in nature and open to dialog with the historic faiths of others in our world.

Has the need for such education ever been greater? It is a sad and retrograde step that some, fearful of where such education may lead, contend against formal theological training, arguing instead for an "apprentice-type" preparation within the confines of a non-denominational congregation cut adrift from centuries of shaping tradition. People "pastored" by the products of such preparation are in danger of being shortchanged and spiritually mal-nourished in a way that cannot sustain them.

Where do ministers come from? Out of the call of God, certainly. Out of a caring experience and nurturing fellowship with others of faith, to be sure. But—in our time perhaps more then ever—out of a responsible, inclusive, faith-expanding seminary.

A approach to help Oakland Technical High School raise its graduation rate and lower the achievement gap is being proposed by the local organizing committee of Lakeshore Church, expressing its commitment to social justice and the belief that education is a civil right. The plan calls for a partnership between the high school, Holy Names University and the church. It anticipates a multi-discipline approach, using student mentors, majors in social work and psychology as assistant case managers and course counselors.
